Our aim is to design and implement a professional development effort that will help empower youth to become “future ready.” Our cross-cultural study is collaboratively designed and conducted by more than 30 researchers from 17 countries.

During this mini-conference, research teams will present: the brief results of the first year, any dissemination work in relation to the project (papers, policy briefs, projects, community or government involvement), the effects of the first year of the project results, and the progress of the second year of the Project. Some other topics to be discussed include SEL education in their country, cultural, socio-political, and historical contexts, and any changes in SEL education and career development in response to COVID-19.

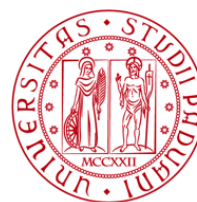
